

KNOX LIBRARY NOTES

Have you noticed lately that there are many books, movies and TV shows debating who Jesus Christ was historically? While they may concede that he was a good teacher (like Buddah) or even a prophet (like Mohammed), they deny he was who he said he was - the Son of God. How does the Jesus of the New Testament compare to the “new, rediscovered” Jesus - or even the Jesus we learned about in Sunday School? Do you have doubts or questions in your mind?

At the heart of Knox Library, there is a selection of books on a shelf titled “JESUS” that you may want to check out, literally.

Jesus: Who Is This Man Who Says He’s God? is a small book by four authors answering such questions as - Who was He? Why did He have to die? And what did the amazing names such as “Mighty God” or “Prince of Peace” say about His mission on Earth?

The Jesus I Never Knew by Philip Yancy has been described as “the best book about Jesus I ever read, probably the best book about Jesus in the whole century... Yancy gently took away my blinders and blazed the trail through my own doubting fears, pious know-it-all and critical balderdash until I saw

the Saviour anew.” Yancy offers a new and different perspective on the life of Christ and his work, his teaching, his miracles, his death and resurrection, and ultimately who he was and why he came. This book uncovers a Jesus who is brilliant, creative, challenging, fearless, compassionate, unpredictable, and ultimately satisfying.
